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Gateway Facts



- One of 16 colleges in the Wisconsin Technical College System
- Founded in 1911
- Serve approximately 20,000 students annually
- Three main campuses split across a tri-county district
- Five discipline-specific technology centers

- 4K through 12 public school system
- Student Population -21,233
- Kenosha Unified consists of three high schools (grades 9-12), five middle schools (grades 6-8), 22 elementary schools (4K-5), five charter schools, five choice schools, one specialty school, one Head Start facility and one district office.



Career Pathways

- Intentional focus on designing systems in 2015
- Use WTCS-approved pathway credentials (certificates and diplomas) to build entry and exit points
 - 20 certificates 2-18 credits, first year of program
 - 15 diplomas 2-54 credits, more flexibility
- Developed with employers, lead to in-demand jobs in our district
- Require no or very little prior experience
- Most courses were already being offered for transcripted credit in the high schools



Career Pathway Maps

- Launched in 2016 to highlight all pathway-related options for each program
- Expanded to all programs, including apprenticeship
- 66 total maps; new maps are added as programs are developed
- Updated annually to reflect changes in options, salary information, etc.
- High school partners are provided with a bound, color copy as well as access to electronic versions

High School Academies

High School Academies include:

- Sequence of courses leading to a credential
- Students can continue on at Gateway furthering their career path
- Courses taught at Gateway's campuses & centers by Gateway faculty
- High school students considered dual credit students
 - Earning both high school & college credit
- High school students have access to same services as Gateway's students including tutoring, disability support, etc.
- Transportation not included
- Funding: Grant funded or high schools pay tuition/fees/books



2018-2020 High School Welding Academy

7 Gateway courses offered over three semesters: 17 Credits

Books, Welding Kit & Supplies funded through DWD Fast Forward High School Student Certification Grant

28 high school students from 15 participating high schools graduated from Gateway <u>before</u> they graduated high school (11 students graduates when they were juniors!)

Outcomes & Future Academies

- 2019-2020 High School Academies:
 - Welding Academy: 28 Graduates
 - Waterford Union HS started offering courses in high school, paying tuition/fees
 - CNC Academy: 8 Completers
- 2020-2021 (Funded by high schools paying tuition/fees):
 - *Advanced Manufacturing (8)
 - Criminal Justice (26)
 - CNC (6)
 - Welding (28)

*Funded by a private donor

Students have the opportunity to continue in Career Path at Gateway after they complete the High School Academy.

High School Perspective

- Kenosha Unified School District
 - 7 students participated in Welding Academy from Bradford, Harborside, Indian Trail Academy, Reuther, Tremper
 - Starting in Fall 2019, KUSD offering Transcripted Credit
 - 2020-2021: 10 students participating in Welding Academy; 3 students participating in Criminal Justice Academy & 1 student participating in SMART Manufacturing
 - KUSD Facilities
 - 51.6% Economically Disadvantaged
 - Youth Apprenticeship / Kenosha Pipeline
 - Act 59 / CTE Technical Incentive Grant
 - District Sustainability
 - Story Bradford graduate
